As We Move into 2026

With one year as President of the local, we are standing at a moment of transition and renewal. The many internal and external issues that demanded so much of our time, energy, and attention are behind us. With those matters resolved, we will refocus fully on what truly matters: representing our members, strengthening our union, and building a future rooted in solidarity, transparency, and growth.

Over the past year, we have taken deliberate steps to strengthen governance and financial oversight.

One of the most important milestones this year is that we are almost fully staffed. My goal was to have a full staff by the end of the year and we are almost there! We have three new employees who have joined our team:

- Joe Bellgowan, supporting our State units
- Larry Sedrowski, supporting HSS, the City of Saginaw, and the St. Joseph County Road Commission

Member leadership development remains a priority. Steward Training will be held on **February 21–22, 2026**, at the Kellogg Center in East Lansing. Michigan State University's Labor Law program will provide a half-day presentation, and staff will facilitate breakout sessions for both new and experienced stewards. This training is designed to meet members where they are and equip them with the tools they need to advocate effectively.

The **State Ambassador Program** is designed to serve multiple purposes, with its most important goal being the identification and development of future leaders within our union. The program creates meaningful opportunities for members to become more involved, gain a broader understanding of the union's mission, values, and structure, and deepen their commitment to both the local and the membership as a whole. In addition to leadership development, the program expands our communication network. State Ambassadors serve as key communicators—helping to share important information, updates, and initiatives from the union to the membership, while also bringing feedback, concerns, and ideas from members back to union leadership. This two-way communication is essential to building trust, engagement, and unity across the organization. Ultimately, the program helps cultivate a strong pipeline of engaged leaders who are prepared to support the union's work today and guide it into the future.

With our various distractions behind us, a full staff in place, engaged members, and clear priorities, we are entering the next chapter of our Local stronger and more focused than ever. Our commitment is simple: to do what is best for our members, to represent them with integrity and strength, and to build a union that is prepared not just for today—but for the future.

When we move forward together, grounded in solidarity and shared purpose, there is nothing we cannot accomplish.

API Caucus - Lue Yang released from Baldwin

Lue Yang, a resident of St. Johns and a Hmong refugee, has been released from ICE custody after being detained since July. Lue, who came to the U.S. legally following the Vietnam War, was transported from an ICE facility in Baldwin, Michigan, to Grand Rapids, where he was warmly greeted by his family and supporters.

In the Lansing area, Lue has made a real difference as a leader with the Hmong Family Association, despite facing challenges with his citizenship due to a past conviction. We're happy to share that Governor Gretchen Whitmer granted him a pardon in October to help prevent his deportation.

"I'm so relieved that Lue is back with his family," said Barrett, who worked tirelessly for his release. "Lue is not an illegal immigrant and poses no threat to our community."

The SEIU, including API Caucus, is actively and firmly against ICE raids and its enforcement practices, advocating for immigrant rights and demanding the abolition of ICE. The union views these raids as "cruel," "unjust," and "economically destructive." The David Huerta Incident: A high-profile incident involved the arrest and injury of SEIU California President David Huerta by ICE in June 2025 while he was peacefully observing a workplace raid in Los Angeles. This event galvanized further protests and statements from the SEIU and other labor organizations like the AFL-CIO, who condemned the actions and demanded his release and the dropping of "baseless charges".

The API SEIU is dedicated to advocating for civil rights, supporting immigrant issues, empowering workers, fighting for wage increases, and improving healthcare and working conditions for AAPI communities and all people of color. SEIU API Caucus here in Michigan actively works with community organizations like Rising Voices, Laotian American Community of Michigan (LACM), and also Immigrant & Refugee Resource Collaborative (IRRC), plus many more, to address immigration issues, providing "Know Your Rights". We're proud of the work being done to support and uplift everyone!

On Monday, December 15, SEIU 517M staff came together to prepare and serve a nutritious lunch at the Southside Community Kitchen. Participating as a team was an important reflection of our union values - solidarity, dignity, and collective care. As a union, we believe in lifting up working people and our communities, and this experience allowed staff to put those values into action beyond the workplace.



The Southside Community Kitchen's mission aligns closely with our own: meeting people where they are, restoring dignity and worth, and creating connection through care and compassion. Each meal is served in a safe, warm, and welcoming space, reminding us that everyone deserves respect and support.

The need for this work is clear. One in six Michiganders experiences food insecurity, including 400,000 children. Rates are higher for certain groups, with significant impacts on low-income families, people of color, and younger adults.

Our time at the Kitchen was a powerful reminder that unions play a vital role not only in advocating for workers' rights, but also in strengthening the communities we are part of.
